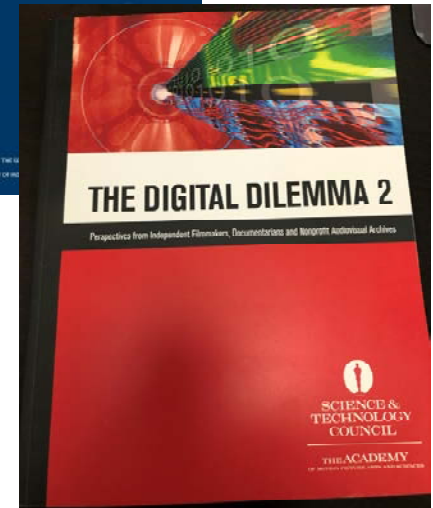


# The Digital Dilemma

In 2007 the Academy published the report *The Digital Dilemma*, followed in 2012 with *The Digital Dilemma 2*, which drew attention to the archiving and preservation challenges posed by the “digitalization” of filmmaking

- Defined the problems
- Researched the issues beyond just the entertainment industry
- Found that digital did not have the same long-term preservation characteristics as film

In the years following, the Academy’s Science and Technology Council engaged in further study and active work in this area

# The Ask

- Remaster, regrade legacy content
- Multiple grades for new content
- Repurpose finished content and transfer to “new media” platforms
- Develop “canonical” workflows for various camera formats  
(Adopt ACES, OpenExr, etc.)  
— *So what is camera raw?*





# Reaction\*

## So what did we do in post ?

- Almost every post house has developed an archival strategy while having to decipher the different archival strategies desired by the studios and content owners
- Traditional motion picture studios have implemented digital preservation strategies (e.g., LTO tape)
- Innovations in “born digital” companies are writing new rules about managing workflows and libraries
- More and more people are leveraging storage in the cloud

# What isn't fixed

And yet the concept of digital preservation continues to be misunderstood, e.g.:

- *It's in the cloud*
- *It's on several LTO tapes*
- *Directors just shoot too much footage, until they stop there's not much we can do about anything*
- *Why do we have to do that? No one's going to be interested in this later.*
- *I've got to get this out the door, this is just not a priority*
- *You are complicating things...*



**Loss of digital data, unlike analog, deterioration is an on/off switch – fading film can be restored – but if data is gone...it's gone**



# The ADPF

- A summit was planned to bring experts, filmmakers, technologists together
  - Planned to convene like-minded stakeholders
  - So many different approaches and ideas we included “flash-talks” in addition to keynote speeches
- So the ADPF is an online gathering
  - The Curatorial Working Group of experts is our guide, as we develop ideas into more substantial videos or papers
  - The discussion forum is truly at the heart of the project – a place for everyone to share points of view and exchange ideas
